Soror Bianca Dorsey, Second Vice President and Scholarship Chair

The Mu Omicron Chapter will be offering two (2) scholarships for the 2023 sorority year - one (1) Merit Scholarship and one (1) Achievement Scholarship, both at \$1,500. The Merit Scholarship is open to qualified applicants with a GPA of 3.0 and higher, and the Achievement Scholarship is open to qualified applicants with a GPA ranging from 2.0 to 2.9.

The scholarship application opens on Friday, February 10, 2023, and closes on Saturday, April 15, 2023. Selected recipients will be notified on Monday, May 15, 2023.

MLK Day of Service

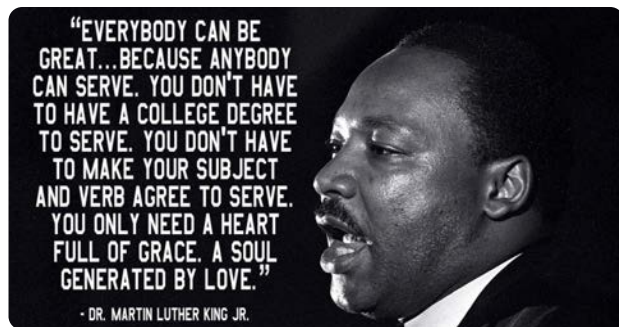

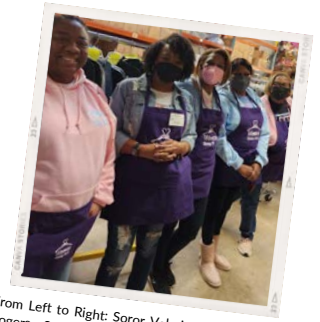

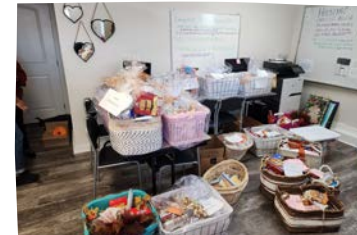
Breakfast with Santa

This event was held at the Northern Virginia Community College (NVCC) Alexandria Campus in Alexandria, Virginia.

Our very own, Madam Basileus, Wyvonna White, opened the retreat with a heartfelt welcome speech and State of the Chapter address. We then installed our newly elected Chapter Officers.

Next, we settled in for our vibrant speakers, Cyndi Dunn, and Shirley Jones, Esq. Ms. Dunn is the Director of the Office of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion, Tax Exempt and Government Entities, within the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Cynthia has held this position in Washington, DC since 2004. She started her federal government career in 1980 as a GS-01 Clerk Typist under the Stay-in-School Program. She began her career in the field of Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity in 1992.

Shirley Jones is a Senior Executive Service (SES) Member at the U. S. Government Accountability Office (GAO). As the first African American female in the agency's history to be appointed to the position of Managing Associate General Counsel, within GAO's Office of General Counsel (OGC) she has appointed to the position of

Managing Associate General Counsel, within GAO's Office of General Counsel (OGC) she has management responsibility for the office's appropriations law function and congressional oversight regarding agency rulemaking and vacancies in presidentially appointed, Senate confirmed positions. Ms. Jones is also a certified leadership and diversity and inclusion trainer at GAO. Ms. Dunn led us in an insightful, engaging, and thought-provoking session on Cross Generational Communication. This session provided common traits and characteristics for generations born as early as 1900 and as late as 1997. It also provided helpful tips and methods on how to work with each generation to maximize productivity and increase group harmony.

Next, we learned the ABC's of Leadership from Ms. Jones. Using some of her personal experiences to paint a vivid picture of workplace leadership challenges, Ms. Jones shared five key tips on being resilient, being self-aware, having organizational awareness, believing in the value of your work, and being a risk taker.

The P&P Committee's goal was to provide a retreat experience with unparalleled training designed to help Sorors achieve new levels of personal and leadership success but also opportunities to reflect upon and celebrate our past accomplishments and collectively explore current and future directions, renew friendships, and extend our networks. During the training, we learned networking do’s and don’ts, how to engage/disengage during professional events, and proper business writing etiquette.



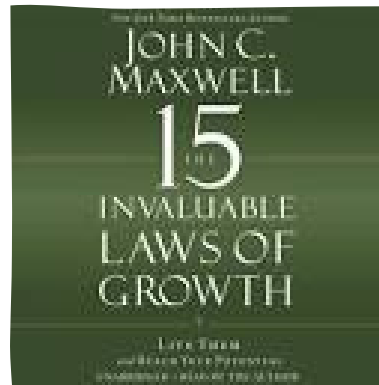

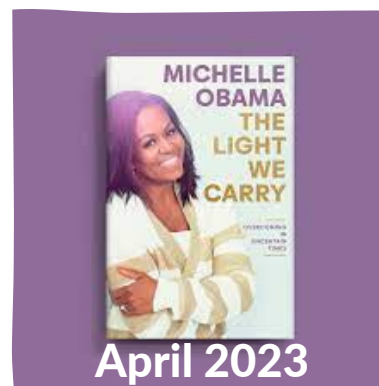
Level Up: Goals, Plans,

SOROR SPOTLIGHT



Soror Pamela Richards



Soror Pamela Richards was inducted into the Mu Omicron chapter on December 5, 2021. Soror Richards was the president of her line, "The Metamor4rces of Mu Omicron" and was known as the "En4rcer". Since joining the Mu Omicron Chapter, Soror Richards has been a member of the Membership and the Personal and Professional Development Committees. Soror Richards, through her support of the membership and personal and professional development committees, assisted with obtaining the guest speakers for the 2022 chapter retreat and the location for the 2022 holiday party.

On July 22, 2022, our very own Soror Richards, was installed as the 25th National President of the Federally Employed Women (FEW). FEW is a private, non-profit organization founded in 1968, shortly after the government issued Executive Order 11375 which added sex-discrimination to the list of prohibited discrimination within the Federal Government. As a private organization, FEW works as an advocacy group to improve the status of women employed by the federal government.

Who is Pamela Richards...

Following in the footsteps of her uncles who served in the military, Soror Richards always dreamed of being a police officer and serving in the military. Soror Richards, when she enlisted in the United States Army, it offered her a "two-for-one" deal, when she became a military police officer.

Looking back on the journey of where Soror Richards started, to where she is now, the road she traveled was not easy and required her to make sacrifices which made her who she is today as a leader. Words that Soror Richards lives by, "Empowered Women Empower Women". Her life is an example of her empowering other women to be the example to follow and to know you do not have to be a statistic and can beat all odds that are stacked against you.

When Soror Richards' dream to go to the military started to take form, she found out she was pregnant. The hardest part was telling her parents, uncle and the recruiter that she would not be able to leave as expected. As a young adult, Soror Richards' dream was delayed but not denied. Through her persistence, she defied the odds of being unmarried and raising a black son. Soror Richards knew the military would provide a secure and abundant life for her and her son. She was also determined to challenge and disprove the myth that African American boys raised by single mothers inevitably become juvenile delinquents by the age of 16.

When her son was three, Soror Richards entered boot camp leaving her son to enter basic training relying on her "village" in taking care of her son, Jonathan, whom she did not see for 13 weeks. Torn between competing desires of wanting to be present in her son's life yet wanting to give him better opportunities, Soror Richards completed her basic training and then reunited with her son.

Soror Spotlight

As a young soldier, Soror Richards spent time in Europe, where she was forced to build a new circle of emotional and spiritual support. Her fondest memories include the network of strong women who served as role models. These warrior women encouraged Soror Richards to persevere in college classes while in the military, never giving up on herself or her dreams, and always to remember her son as the reason why she needed to excel.

These networks also helped to weather the biggest challenge Soror Richards faced in the military: repeatedly having to prove herself and her worth. She was one of only a few women in her platoon, which was consistent with the number of women throughout the Army at that time. In the male-dominated scene, Soror Richards found solace and inspiration in these rare female friendships. Soror Richards attributes her success to her transferable skills as a mother.

Fast-forward to the present, Soror Richards is the 25th National President of the FEW, something she did not picture for herself, but others saw this in her. In 2013, Soror Richards went to a conference filled with women, something she had never seen before besides in church. This conference was about leadership learning, and training. To go and to see this, she wanted to be a part of the organization (FEW). Soror Richards began to work in the organization and the first position she held was the Vice President of her chapter. She self taught herself about the organization and wanted to pay it forward to someone else. As the current president of FEW, Soror Richards continues to help women, serving over 26 chapters, monitoring and ensuring that training is up to date while advocating for women's rights to be paid the same opportunities as male counterparts.

Soror Richards contributed her success to her transferable skills as a mother to the leader she is today. As a mother she always led by example. It took Soror Richards ten years to complete her first degree, but she was determined to lead by example for her son. Soror Richards later went on and received her Master's degree letting other women see despite being a single mom, that it could be done. Soror Richards's son, did not become a delinquent as statistics would dictate, but went to military school while his mom was in the military, then went on to graduate college, now owns his own media company, Roseland Media (named after his mom) and travels the world with his film production. Soror Richards wanted to be an example to single mothers and women, that you can make it and do what you want to do, even if it took you a while.

The chapter spotlights Soror Richards on her success in becoming the 25th President of FEW and her continued work in advocating and advancing the leadership and training of women to be future leaders.
